Safeguarding Snippet (Spring 1)

Continuing the theme of online safety from the last newsletter, this term I wanted to remind you of the age rating and the symbols you will find on computer games. These are really important indicators of the suitability of a game for your child.

Unfortunately, not all online platforms have such easy-to-recognise indicators and it can be hard to tell if a website or other platform is suitable for your child so it is also important to look into these and try them fully for yourself to be sure they are appropriate and safe.

These are the symbols found on computer games:



Online gaming can be lots of fun but it is useful to talk to your child about ways this may not be fun, for instance if they feel like they cannot stop playing or get too competitive with other people. Online gaming can cause children to get into trouble if it impacts on family life or can cause friendship issues as it can be easier to fall out online than in person.

Talking to your child about how they feel - good and bad - about gaming, means that they are more likely to say when something does go wrong or if anything worries them about playing online. Children can worry that if they tell their parents this, they may stop them playing the games altogether so it may be useful to remind them that you are there to help and support them to play safely.

Childline has a really useful page for parents and children about online gaming and how to keep this fun. It is primarily aimed at children themselves but gives useful ideas for parents and prompts for discussion.

Teaching and Learning update

In our recent training day, we looked at more strategies to engage pupils in speaking and active listening. This supports our aim to increase oracy skills across school. Oracy is the ability to express yourself clearly and communicate with others effectively through spoken language.


Children across school are already really good at not only answering questions in class, but also in going on to explain why they came to that answer or opinion. When we talk to children about their learning they show broad vocabularies and the ability to explain what they have learned. However, some pupils are inevitably a bit quieter than others or find answering questions in class more daunting and we want everyone to find their voice and grow in confidence so we have looked at strategies to support these pupils in particular.

Miss Christian has been trialling the strategies of 'No Hands Up' and 'Answer Free Zones' for a while now and seen very good success with these methods in encouraging everyone to have a go at speaking. Miss Christian uses these symbols on the smart board to indicate the strategies to pupils:

The No Hands Up symbol shows children that they should use thinking time when a question is asked. This enables them to think without the pressure of others already seeming to have the answer, lets them think through their answer as they know they have time and helps them prepare what they want to say, even if they can only say part of the solution or understand part of a concept. Their teacher can then ask individuals what they think and support them to share their thoughts.



This example of an answer Free Zone indicates to children that the teacher is not looking for an answer but for an explanation of the strategy that the child would use to work out the answer:





Since using these strategies, Miss Christian has found that:

- there are more hands up when the no hands up symbol is not used than before
- there is more focus on/understanding of steps towards solving problem
- children show more confidence within class discussions
- all children understand the symbols as they are very clear
- she is confident that she is assessing what pupils really know and understand as they are more confident to say

We are looking forward to seeing how this impacts learners across school this term.

Oracy is a vital skill to enable children to be successful learners, both now and in the future. Voice 21 is the UK's oracy education charity and they state that, 'Spoken language skills are one of the strongest predictors of a child's future life chances but too many children are not given the opportunity to develop these crucial skills.'
